Archery Marshal

At Lughnasad in Adult Archery - We had a bear pit archery shoot. There was head to head competition between two archers with the target set at 20 yards. The winner scored two points and the loser scored one point for participation. The bear pit lasted one and a half hours. Lord Martino Arciere was the winner with a total of 32 points. Ten archers participated.

In Children's Archery - The children participated in a dragon shoot. The dragon was placed 20 yards from the shooting line. Each hit on the dragon body was one point, a head hit was two points and a heart shot was three points. The hero dragon slayer was Wolfhart with 12 points. Thirteen children participated in the dragon slaying. We had five children archers who were participating in their first event. A special mention should be made for a four year old archer from Loch Ruadh, Mario Viscante. It was his first event shoot and scored two points on the dragon.

Lord Gruffydd Mawr ap Rodri and Lady Katya were authorized as archery marshals.

The SCA According to Padraig
Speaking Forsoothly
Part Six

Hail, and well met!

Herein doth follow lessons 26 through 28, covering all manner of information concerning money, its designations and its spending. I have also included some rough equivalents to modern American money to aid in understanding how much things actually cost. Remember though, these are VERY rough estimates.

Lesson 26
Money – 1

(Note: As we have been dealing in Elizabethan/Shakespearean English, so too will our discussion of money reference English coinage.)

All coins, including pennies, are silver or gold. There is no copper money. Some older coins may be debased with copper or brass, but no one would mistake a shilling for a penny, as the difference is very obvious.

There is no paper money. You cannot, for example, have a 5-pound note.

The basic denominations are pounds, shillings, and pence:

12 pence make a shilling
20 shillings make a pound

In writing, the abbreviation for:

penny is d
shilling is s
pound is £

A penny is a coin. One of them is always a penny, not a pence. The term pence is used ONLY for amounts of more than one penny, and refers to worth.

If you have a pouchful of 1-penny coins, you have several pennies, which values several pence.

Two pennies (or a two-penny coin) are tuppence.
Three pennies are thruppence.
Six pennies (or a six-penny coin) are sixpence.

Amounts, as discussed in an earlier lesson, are expressed verbally as number of pounds with the stated word “pound(s)”, number of shillings (with no stated

word), number of pence (with no stated word).

Example: “2 pounds, 3 and 8”, for 2 pounds, 3 shilling and eight pence.

Written out, it would take the form number of pounds followed by the pound sign (£), number of shillings followed by the shilling sign (s), and number of pence, followed by the pence sign (d).

Example: “2£ 3s 8d”

However, as you will see in Lessons 27 and 28, there was no coin called the “pound” until very late in Period, and other designations were most often used.

Lesson 27
Money – 2
The Coins

Sovereign: a gold coin worth 1 pound (think of it as 20 shillings). There is no coin called the “pound” until after 1583, although that is the basic monetary unit.

Angel: one of the most common gold coins. The angel is worth 10 shillings (1/2 pound). Not usually used in speak of a number of coins; you would never say you owed somebody 6 angels, but you might give your servant an angel to spend at faire. To coerce someone, you might suggest that the sweet voice of an angel would convince him.

Crown: the most common large coin, worth 5 shillings, and could be either gold or silver. (The crown is roughly equal to a Venetian ducat, a Flemish gelder, or a French êcu, which is sometimes referred to as a French crown).

Half-a-crown: equal to 2 shillings 6 pence (sometimes expressed as “2 and 6”). Usually silver.

Shilling: a silver coin worth 12 pence. (Remember, 20 shillings make a pound).

Sixpence: a silver coin worth six pence. Pronounced as one word: “SIX-pence”

Groat: a silver coin worth 4 pence.

Thruppence: a silver coin worth 3 pence.

Tuppence: a silver coin worth 2 pence.

Penny: a silver coin worth a penny (one penny is never called a pence).

Ha'penny: a half-penny (not a ha'pence). Pronounced "HAY-peh-nee"

Farthing: a 1/4-penny.

You may know the old Christmas Carol, "Christmas is Coming":

Christmas is coming, the goose is getting fat
Please put a penny in the old man's hat
If you have no penny, a ha'penny will do
If you have no ha'penny, a farthing will do
If you have no farthing, then God bless you

Lesson 28

Money – 3 Spending

In Period, ordinary amounts of money are rarely referred to in terms of pounds, unless among the nobility or merchant class speaking in terms of taxes, trading voyages or the like, as a pound, originally an actual pound of gold, was a large sum.

Ordinary wages, earnings and expenditures would be in terms of crowns, shillings and pence. ("I sold that last shipment of French cloth for 7 crowns and 4 shillings at market.") A pound was a substantial amount of money, and many people's annual wages or earnings could be expressed in shillings and pence. When speaking of the value of an item, rather than substituting pounds for dollars, try using shillings, or even pennies, depending on the item. Ten pounds for a tunic would have been unthinkable, but 10 shillings, while expensive, would be much more reasonable for a Period cost. For items like food and drink, use pennies. Tuppence for a beer is about right, and a meal at a tavern might run sixpence. Some rough equivalents that may put things more in perspective:

Sovereign	-	50 dollars
Angel	-	25 dollars
Crown	-	10 dollars
Half-a-crown	-	5 dollars
Shilling	-	1 dollar
Sixpence	-	50 cents
Groat	-	about 35 cents
Thruppence	-	quarter
Tuppence	-	dime

Penny	-	nickle
Ha'penny	-	2-1/2 cents
Farthing	-	penny

Even this may be too low, so think in terms of 1950's prices; a first class stamp was 3 cents (about a ha'penny), a soda was a nickle (a penny), a hamburger a dime (tuppence), a loaf of bread a quarter (thruppence), etc.

Tips would reflect this as well. A household-type servant, a server at an inn or an hostler's apprentice would be extraordinarily well paid if he made 2 or 3 pounds per year. A generous tip might be tuppence or thruppence. This kind of tip was known as a vail.

NOTE: In trying to obtain information or a favor from someone besides a servant, use gifts instead of money. For servants, coin of the Realm is the preferred offering.

Shakespearian Words/Phrases to use:

Coil – trouble or strife.

"Belike we shall find him in the midst of the coil; 'tis there he seems most happy."

Fell – galled, angry, melancholy

"Ware the Duke this day; he lost at dice last e'en, and is in a fell mood."

Kickshaws – trifles, trivia

"Whilst waiting for Court to begin, we amused ourselves with various kickshaws."



NEWCOMERS ARE NICE...Once You Get to Know Them

Advice to Established Members

Having to talk with newcomers can be unnerving for some people, but we all share one thing in common – we were all, once upon a time, newcomers to the SCA. Somehow we survived the “newby” period to become the more “experienced” member. For many, orientation to the SCA was provided by a friend who was already a member, but nowadays more and more people are coming into the SCA by themselves. Therefore, many groups have an official host (chatelain/hospitaller) whose main function is to meet new people, answer questions, give out literature and steer the newcomer to the appropriate resources. However, an official chatelain should not exist so that no one else need bother with new people. The chatelain *supplements* each individual member’s efforts to greet new faces. How can you help welcome a new person?

First, *go up and say hello*. If you are not that “old” in the group, ask if the person is new. Sometimes it is a veteran member who is showing up after a long absence! Sound pleased, but not gushy, that the new person was interested enough to come. New people have a need to be noticed. Greeting someone is an easy way to provide simple recognition. Keep in mind that you are probably far more comfortable in the SCA than the new person is. The SCA is your bailiwick. You can afford to provide the recognition the newcomer needs to feel more secure in the strange environment and be glad he or she came. This is known as courtesy to strangers, and dukes as well as commoners practice it.

Introduce the new person to your friends and to those working on crafts. The new person may not remember who they are, but perhaps the members will speak with the newcomer later in the meeting or at future meetings. Being left alone and ignored is very hard on a new person!

Ask what the newcomer knows about the SCA. That gives a place to start a conversation and to fill in some gaps in knowledge. Ask why they came to the SCA and listen with courtesy. Inquire about modern-day hobbies and interests. It may help you identify what areas they might like to know more about. When you want to go back to your business, suggest that they might like to look around and then come back to talk with you before they leave. Check back with them before the end of the meeting if they haven’t come back to you.

Ask the person if you can explain what is going on. Too often, established members will say, “If you have any questions, just ask,” and then walk away. New people often do not know what they want to know, or they may not have a question that they think is worth asking. Instead, try something like, “Come with me while I...” and then explain what is going on. Experiment with:

- “May I explain...?”
- “Are you interested in...?”
- “What do you like to do?”
- “What are your interests/hobbies?”
- “Would you like to talk to someone about... (leatherworking, cooking, embroidery, fighting, armor, calligraphy, archery, costuming, music, brewing, etc.)?”
- “What can I explain?”
- “May I introduce you to someone who knows about...?”

Help the newcomer participate. If the group is participating in some activity such as dancing, do be sure that you invite the newcomer. Don’t wait for the dance leader to think of it. And don’t expect that most newcomers will ask a member to dance! Remember, too, ladies, that if there are not enough lords, you can ask a female newcomer to dance with you. Use the nice touches of courtesy such as “my lord”, “my lady” and polite gestures such as a slight bow or curtsy, especially if you are in garb. Being called “my lord” or “my lady” enhances the feeling of participation and offers a touch of confidence to the newcomer.

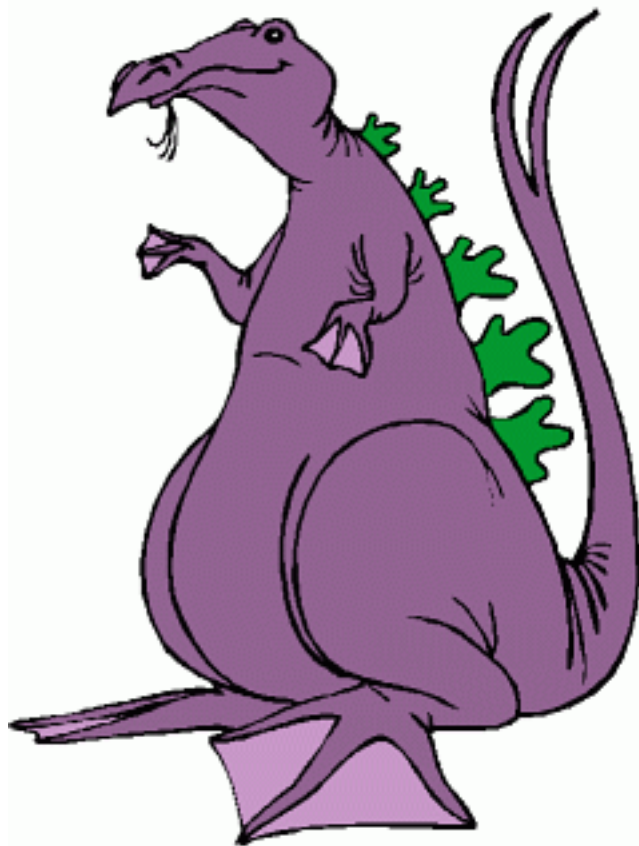
See that newcomer information is available. Arrange with the seneschal or chatelain/hospitaller to have newcomer material brought each week, such as a copy of the kingdom’s newcomer booklet, the SCA’s Forward into the Past, a copy of Tournaments Illuminated and/or your kingdom’s newsletter. You might also want to have a copy of Compleat Anachronist, instructions for making simple garb, a photo album, and so forth. Include a local group handout listing meeting place and times, especially for guilds or interest groups, a contact person and phone number or e-mail address. Give out a copy of the group’s newsletter. Bring an SCA membership form and an order form for items from the Stock Clerk.

Get the newcomer’s name and contact information. Ask them to sign a “guest book” so that you have a way to contact them if they come to several meetings and

then don't show up. Ask why they haven't been attending. Their reasons may be illuminating!

With all this, keep in mind that a newcomer may suffer from overload. There is so much to see and learn! There are too many people doing too many quality pieces of handcrafts and the newcomer may feel as if he or she can never measure up to the experienced member's level of skill. Having been told something once is no guarantee that the new person heard it or will remember it. That is why brief, informal newcomer meetings can be so important and why continued, personal contact from you, the established member, is so vital to their continued participation.

May you never lack for something to say to a new person and may your group never lack a steady supply of new people!
